

HNRS 101—Honors Inquiry
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Colloquium Faculty and Guest Speakers

Course Description

HNRS 101 is a zero-credit course that is required for participation in Honors. This course is designed to allow students in their first year (including transfers) to get the most out of their experience in Honors. HNRS 101 will focus on content related to identity formation and worldview construction along with information about Honors resources and requirements. Assigned readings and writing or project assignments will vary each semester depending on current events, the campus common read, and faculty topics for the colloquium. Additionally, students will be required to attend all Honors Colloquium events during the semester in which they are enrolled in the class. This course is designed to be taken twice and in sequence, beginning in the fall semester. It meets bi-monthly seven times each semester.

Student Learning Outcomes

- Students will develop knowledge of Honors resources and requirements.
- Students will develop critical thinking skills through an examination of readings and topics related to diversity and inclusion.
- Students will develop knowledge of current leadership and scholarship through review of preparatory material for all colloquium events.

Additionally, students must earn a satisfactory evaluation on the following assignments:

- Colloquium Attendance
- Inquiry Readings and Discussion Activities
- Participation on Blackboard or PebblePad (depending on the course materials management system currently in use)

Students will earn a satisfactory evaluation by preparing for and fully participating in the assignments above. Students who do not earn a grade of “S” in Honors Inquiry will lose good standing in Honors.

Colloquium Attendance

"Colloquium" is Latin for dialogue or conversation. The Honors Colloquium is an opportunity for students to meet and talk with local, regional, and national leaders and scholars about topics that relate to the semester's courses. The Honors Colloquium series may also include museum trips, service projects, productions, and other leadership and learning activities. **Students are expected to attend three of the scheduled colloquia each semester.** The dates for these events are listed below in **bold type**.

If a student must miss a colloquium event for any reason, that student must propose and attend a make-up event on the Wichita State University campus or in the community. Make-up events must be approved by an Honors faculty mentor or the Honors Advisor (Jessi Raburn), and students may be required submit a 500-word essay or video summarizing and responding to the event. Reading and Participation

Each member of the class shares the responsibility for creating a positive and stimulating learning environment. Preparation, participation, and respect for the ideas of others will allow for in-depth exploration of complex issues and examination of multiple perspectives.

Your thoughtful comments, questions, and insights are needed to enhance the learning for all students and thus contribute to a creative and constructive experience. Prompt attendance at all class sessions is required. Tardiness, late work, and/or lack of engagement will negatively impact this part of your grade.

Students who miss class must make up the work by following instructions found in the corresponding module. **This work is due within 7 days of the missed class.**
